Background

- Health Hub commenced operation in 2019.
- Partnership with the Western Australian Centre for Rural Health.
- Located at Karratha Shopping Centre.
- Hours were Thursdays from 11am to 5pm.
- Services:
 - Immunisation
 - Sexual health screens
 - RHD treatment
- Staffed by 2-3 nurses and 1 AHW.





Data Collection and Analysis

- Community Health Information System (CHIS)
- Report for clinical items:
 - Checklist and Consent
 - Immunisations provided
- Dates
 - 30 January 2020 to 31 August 2023
- Location
 - Clients with an encounter place of 'Karratha Health Hub.'
- Review client seen and vaccines given at encounter to determine schedule:
 - Childhood (6-8 weeks, 4 month, 6 month, 12 month, 18 month)
 - Influenza
 - Adult
 - Antenatal (dTpa)
 - Catch-Up
 - Overseas Catch-Up
 - SBIP



Data Collection and Analysis

- If eligible, document if influenza vaccine given.
 - If vaccine was unavailable (i.e. February to April), then 'N/A' documented.
- Timeliness recorded for clients attending for childhood schedule by days. Did not include:
 - Catch-up
 - Overseas catch-up
- Overdue
 - Determined by timeliness
 - If vaccines given >30 days after due
- Descriptive analysis only.






- 2078 vaccine encounters.
 - 592 (28.5%) Aboriginal clients
 - Age range 6 weeks to 77 years.
 - Median age is 4 years.
 - 56.6% were <5 years.
- 3,790 vaccines given.
 - 1,253 were influenza vaccines.





- 2,078 vaccine encounters.
 - 872 (41.9%) influenza vaccine only.
 - 834 (40.1%) childhood schedule.
 - 158 (7.6%) antenatal.
 - 91 (4.4%) SBIP.
 - 102 (4.9%) catch-up (inc. overseas)
 - 47 (2.3%) overseas catch-up.
 - 22 (1.1%) adult.






- Influenza vaccines
 - Of the 1,874 encounters where the client was eligible to receive the vaccine and it was available.
 - 1,250 (66.7%) received a vaccine.
 - Data was not further analysed to determine if client received influenza vaccine elsewhere and hence did not receive it during this encounter.
 - Of the 145 antenatal presentations where the influenza vaccine was available
 - 81 also received an influenza vaccine with the dTpa.
- Catch-Up
 - Of the 49 children requiring catch-up
 - 18 required vaccines from two schedules (i.e. 6 and 12 month).




Occasions of service by month and year

Timeliness

- Of the 833 clients who were seen for childhood vaccines (not catch-up)
 - 376 (45.1%) received their scheduled vaccines 30 days or less from due date.
 - 457 (54.9%) were delayed in receiving their scheduled vaccines (>30 days after due).
- Of the 457 clients who were overdue for childhood vaccines
 - Ranged from 1 day to 910 days overdue.
 - Half (n = 231) were seen within three months of becoming due.
- Changed each year, with a large decrease in 2023
 - Range 47% (2023) to 63% (2022)



- The main reason for presenting for vaccination was for influenza and childhood vaccines.
- Most presentations for childhood vaccines were in children overdue (>30 days).
- Health Hub is an accessible service for childhood, Influenza, catch-up, adult, and school vaccines.

Limitations

- No further information for clients not receiving influenza vaccines
- No comparison with other Karratha Community Health services.
- Errors in data.

What Next?

- Service closed its doors on 5 October 2023.
- The space will now be used by the local AMS.
- Continue to look for an alternative space to provide another access point for vaccinations in the community.
