Aim of Moorditj Kids Program

Aim of Moorditj Kids Program is to improve immunisation coverage in Aboriginal children and adolescents in the Perth metropolitan region.

Moorditj Kids Immunisation Team is a mobile service offering vaccinations in the home for families who cannot access a clinic.

Home visits are attended by an Aboriginal Health Liaison Officer (AHLO) and immunisation nurse.

It is an alternative service delivery model for high priority clients that addresses known barriers to immunisation including transport, competing demands, cost and cultural safety.



Process involved in Moorditj Kids Immunisation outreach

The process commences with Boorloo Public Health Intelligence (PHI) team following a standard operating procedure regarding the methodology for overdue children, who are imported into the Moorditj Kids REDCap database for follow up.

Children who are flagged as overdue, Identify as Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander and has metropolitan address in the AIR report are imported.

We also accept referrals of priority children from community and health services who require home visit vaccination

Children requiring Moorditj Kids immunisation home visit

When all else fails to result in vaccination.

 If letters/phone calls/facilitating support/transport with other health services for family and guardians does not result in vaccinations.....







Having a mobile, flexible and adaptable service for the highest priority families to reduce gaps and improve equitable immunisation coverage.

Family not contactable or engaging after initial phone calls.


Limited local knowledge of family needs or situation.


Family having to leave home/Perth.

Illness, current stressful family situations.

Trust not built. Family shame and embarrassed......

Priority of NEED for immunisations not compatible for the Priority of NEEDS of the family at this point of time.
















Building Collaborative Partnerships

Clear Goals

Having aligned health goals such as health and wellbeing of child and family, which includes vaccinations.

Trust

Building a Partnership framework based on mutual collaborative support, transparency, and open communication.

Framework of a successful collaborative partnership to vaccinate priority overdue children.

Clear Roles

Commitment

Clearly defined roles and responsibilities of each service and defined boundary limitations of provision of vaccination service delivery.

Identifying key drivers who are proactive and invested in the partnership success.

Collaborative Partnership benefits:

Clear communication.

Well defined roles and responsibilities.

Aligned goals/outcomes.

Building valued Partnerships: Working collaboratively. Establishing trust between services.

Health equity consideration: Accessible and culturally safe services.

Local knowledge within community: Organisations have reach within community & local knowledge

Local drivers and champions: Local engagement with families, having foundations of trust established.

Local knowledge of families: PRIORITY OF NEEDS and appropriate intervention and support.

Reducing hurdles and hesitancy: Local engagement, familiar and trusted.

Face to face: Local staff supporting families face to face, door knocking, yarning in familiar safe spaces.
