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Preface – about the Chronic Disease Prevention Directorate

The Chronic Disease Prevention Directorate (CDPD) sits within the Public and Aboriginal Health Division of the Department of Health. CDPD was established in October 2010, signalling the Department of Health's intent to play a leading role in developing and advancing the state and national preventive health agendas. CDPD's work is focused on reducing the prevalence of modifiable risk factors common to most preventable chronic diseases:

- · overweight and obesity
- poor diet
- · physical inactivity
- smoking.

CDPD is also responsible for injury prevention initiatives and policies in Western Australia (WA). Preventing injury is often considered in partnership with approaches to prevent chronic disease because addressing lifestyle risk factors also helps reduce the incidence of injury in the community.

CDPD also hosts the Cultural Diversity Unit, which develops and promotes policies, practices and services that build the WA health system's cultural competency and strengthens accessibility, safety and quality of services and care for culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

Since its establishment, CDPD has played a leading role in setting statewide policies and priorities for preventing chronic disease and injury. These are outlined in the <u>WA Health Promotion Strategic Framework 2022–2026</u>.

1. Introduction

The need for cross sector collaboration for prevention




Figure 1: Figure based on Determinants of health (Australian Institute of Health and Welfare)⁴

The social determinants of health – the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age – have a profound and lifelong influence on health behaviours and outcomes. A person's physical and psychological makeup interact with their societal, environmental and socioeconomic conditions, their knowledge and attitudes, health risk behaviours and biomedical factors and shape their health and wellbeing over time. Broader influences of society, access to health services, social support, and the built and natural environments can strengthen or undermine individual and community health (Figure 1).

Promoting the conditions that support all Western Australians to thrive therefore depends on policies and initiatives that fall beyond the reach of the health system. Recent reviews by the WA Government have called for the need for a cross-sectoral approach to address complex issues such as obesity, alcohol-related violence and harm, community safety, climate change and social inequity.^{1,2}

The <u>Final Report</u> of the Sustainable Health Review (SHR, 2019) identified eight enduring strategies for high quality health care and sustainability. The first of these is to 'commit and collaborate to address major public health issues'. Included among these are obesity and harmful use of alcohol, and inequities in health outcomes for some population groups. The SHR recognises that secure housing, education, employment and the environment play a significant role in the health and wellbeing of individuals and communities and calls tackling the social determinants of health a 'collective responsibility'.

The SHR Report is the reference point for post–COVID work across the health system for the next 10 years.³

The WA health system's capacity to bring about better health outcomes for Western Australians therefore depends how well it is able to engage with, find common ground and work across the public sector. At the same time, it is understood that other government departments and agencies have their own priorities and strategic frameworks that guide their work.

2. Aim of this report

The aim of this report is to identify and map areas of shared interest, and complementary strategies, policies and initiatives across the WA public sector that contribute to the prevention of chronic disease and injury.

It is hoped that this report will be used as a basis for strengthening collaboration on cross-government actions to improve the health and wellbeing of Western Australians.

3. Scope

This report focuses on policies, plans and projects being implemented by Government departments and agencies that will contribute to reducing preventable chronic disease and injury and promote health and wellbeing, in alignment with the core priorities of CDPD.

It is beyond the scope of this project to document all aspects of public health and prevention that contribute to the protection and promotion of health in WA but as noted above it takes a broad social determinants approach to chronic disease and injury prevention. This means that activities which have been identified that support broader community health and wellbeing (such as initiatives that contribute to better mental health, strengthened community engagement, and a reduction in health inequities) have been included.

Policies and plans that all public sector departments and agencies are required to develop that will contribute to better public health outcomes are excluded. These include:

- post-COVID agency recovery plans
- Reconciliation Action Plans
- Equal Opportunity Plans
- Disability Access and Inclusion Plans
- plans prepared to support implementation of the Western Australian Multicultural Policy Framework and the Western Australian Climate Policy (except where the specific focus of these policies is on health outcomes).

It is not within the scope of this project to document Western Australian legislation as it concerns health.

4. Methods

The 2021-22 version of this report is the third major update for the project. The review was restricted to desktop research of WA Government Department and agency websites because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Project history

In 2011, the Director, CDPD contacted and met with senior officers (Tiers 2/3) of a number of WA public sector agencies. At that time, the extent to which WA public sector agencies recognised their capacity to improve community health and wellbeing, and/or acknowledge public health considerations as part of their routine business, had not been documented. A summary report that mapped areas of intersecting interest was drafted and shared on a confidential basis with the agencies that contributed to it. Agencies were invited to comment on their entries and the document was amended accordingly.

Following the Machinery of Government changes in July 2017, the project was updated, and the findings shared as before.

5. Intersecting preventive health policy, strategies and initiatives

The common policy areas, strategies and initiatives of WA Government departments and agencies that help to prevent chronic disease and injury have been organised under 4 broad domains (Figure 2):

- 1. Healthy and safe settings
- 2. Healthy people and communities
- 3. Healthy food and drinks
- Healthy recreation 4.

Each domain includes a number of sub-themes. In some cases, the domains overlap and share one or more sub-themes.

Government departments and agencies are mapped by domains and sub-themes in the following tables (Tables 1-4). The tables show that there are substantial areas of shared interest between the WA Department of Health and other Departments and Agencies.

Discussions and dealings with officers in many of these Departments and Agencies confirms that there is a strong and active collaboration across the public sector, through formal and informal working groups and networks and partnerships, to ensure that policies are aligned and coherent.

These existing intersections provide a strong foundation for maximising the impact of policies and programs through more strategic interagency engagement and collaboration, and for additional identification of mechanisms for advancing common interests within existing resources and capabilities.

A brief overview of individual Department and Agency initiatives, strategies and policies and initiatives is provided in Section 7. This identifies areas of shared interest and key strategies, policies and initiatives relevant to chronic disease and injury prevention.

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6. Next steps for this project

Mapping policy synergies for the prevention of chronic disease and injury is an important step in maintaining enduring and effective partnerships between the Chronic Disease Prevention Directorate, WA Department of Health and other Government Departments and Agencies. It also provides an opportunity to identify where there are new opportunities for linkages and collaboration.

A short version of Tables 1–4 has been published in the <u>WA Health Promotion</u> <u>Strategic Framework 2022–2026</u> in response to strong community interest in the extent to which preventive health concerns are reflected in the business of government agencies, in line with a social determinants approach to health and wellbeing.

The intention is that this report will be a 'living document'. WA Government Departments and Agencies are invited to review the information that has been collated and to provide updates to their work as it intersects with preventive health measures of the Chronic Disease Prevention Directorate. 7. WA Public Sector – Departments and Agencies

7.1 Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions

The <u>Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions</u> (DBCA) promotes biodiversity and conservation through sustainable management of WA's species, ecosystems, lands and attractions. The department comprises the <u>Parks and</u> <u>Wildlife Service</u>, the <u>Conservation and Parks Commission</u>, the <u>Botanic Gardens</u> <u>and Parks Authority</u>, the <u>Zoological Parks Authority</u>, the <u>Rottnest Island Authority</u>, and the <u>Swan River Trust</u>.

CDPD takes a population-wide perspective, encouraging healthy behaviours in people who are well or at risk of developing chronic disease or being injured. CDPD supports the improvement of health literacy and better health – promoting policies and outcomes for WA's culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

The Safety Regulation Group has a number of roles, including overseeing the regulatory and policy requirements of workers' health and safety in the resources and general industries sectors, and safety legislation for dangerous goods, including the State's major hazard facilities, and petroleum operations. <u>Worksafe</u> works with employers, employees and employee representatives to set up and maintain systems of work so that employees are not exposed to hazards, in line with WA work health and safety laws.

The Commission implements WA's road safety strategy and advocates for a 'Safe System' approach to road safety using the principals of Safe Road Use, Safe Roads and Roadsides, Safe Speeds, and Safe Vehicles.

The <u>Road Safety Council</u> operates under the *Road Safety Council Act 2002*. The Council's membership includes the Western Australia Police Force, Main Roads Western Australia, Department of Transport; Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage, Western Australian Local Government Association, Department of Health, Department of Education, Insurance Commission of Western Australia, and the Royal Automobile Club of Western Australia. The Road Safety Council sets priorities based on crash trends and makes recommendations to the Minister for Police and Road Safety.

<u>The Road Trauma Trust Account</u> receives all revenue from photographic speed and red-light camera fines in WA. The funds are managed by the Road Safety Commission and provided to implement priority road safety projects that address road safety initiatives consistent with state strategy.
