

Enucleation Discharge advice

What is Enucleation?

Enucleation is the surgical removal of an eyeball.

Pain control

- Give paracetamol or ibuprofen for pain if required see manufacturer's instructions.

Directions

- Normal diet and fluids.
- Avoid submerging face in water during bath time.
- The conformer is a small plastic shell used to maintain the shape of the eye socket while waiting for the artificial eye. This is used to shape the eye socket.
- The conformer that is to be left in the eye socket at all times.
- Apply eye ointment and give oral antibiotics as prescribed.
- Always wash hands before touching the eye area or conformer.
- The artificial eye will be fitted at six to eight weeks post-operation.

Signs of infection

- Observe wound/s for increase in:
 - \circ swelling
 - o redness
 - o increasing Pain
 - o temperature
 - \circ excessive ooze (blood or pus).
- If these signs occur please seek medical advice as soon as possible.

Daily activity

Activity as discussed with your eye doctor.

Review

Follow-up appointment will be arranged prior to discharge.
